In Transition. Change on the Horizon

An Elder, Transition Team Member, and this Newsletter Editor Takes a Look at What this Means for Our Congregation and our Future.

Transition. The word often carries with it an unsettling sense of insecurity.

For those of us who worship here, have been members here for years, or have recently crossed our threshold and have felt the warming embrace of a caring, compassionate

congregation at Central Park Church, it means *change is coming*. So we seek, as human beings, to peer into the future for answers and too often fear the what we can't quite see. And then retreat when we can't quite hear that "still, small voice," and find a missing of "the Word" in a "wordless wilderness." It brings home that snippet of verse from 1 Corinthians 13:12, "For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but



then shall I know even as also I am known." Has the Lord not given us a handbook, a lifetime owners manual, to get us through these times?

We recently heard a guest pastor here say that we, as a people—and as Christians—often see these events that take us to the depths of the valley of despair, and those "dark places of the soul," as an "end." And, too often, a "dead end," or that "Wordless wilderness" as he so vividly characterized it. We fear change because it represents the end of something, and we may not like what that may mean, and what may happen to us next.

To be clear, our church family has been struggling in that "valley," losing dear worship friends to attrition, to Covid Pandemic fatigue, to death. We have been losing finacially for the past few months and we fear we may never recover. Our "home team" has taken some losses and the cheering has become faint as we dread falling to the bottom of the standings (and yes, I also dread the end of the baseball season). Losing takes its toll. Our hearts have been "divided" by the events of these past few years. And now we face the incertainty of a full-time Pastor-less few months.

Twelve years ago we were comforted on our last transition by a guy named Al. He knew us. We knew him. And we breathed an 18-month sigh of relief — even as he challenged us to look ahead and see — with his trademark question, "What's that going to look like?"

OUR FAITH-LED DECISIONS

Supervising Consistory & Shepherding Elders Leadership Notes ... from August 2023

- The Supervising Consistory continues to be shepherded and coached by Pastor Mark Waterstone from Rose Park Reformed Church as our Classis Supervisor during our pastoral vacancy.
- The Transition Team has spent a number of hours reviewing candidates, getting references from the two strongest candidates, and will present their findings in September to Consistory. As noted last month, Lynn VanHekken, Max Blumer & Jessica Stam were added to Exec Team to round out the Transition Team overseeing ministry and guiding the transition.
- Tom Grabill, who spoke to the congregation in July, is the Transitional Ministry Coordinator from the Regional Synod and has been thoughtfully assisting and guiding us through the next steps in the pastoral transition.
- Churches in Mission Team met and discussed their process which will take about 5-6 more months to complete. They discussed community outreach, the status of the Food Pantry and a possible invite to the community to visit us and get an idea of how they might be be informed/brought up-to-date regarding our food ministry.
- Supervising Consistory discussed at length the budget and our concerns regarding the use and deployment of the Vision for Mission fund, including a recommendation for paying the RCA and local shares out of VFM in case there are future shortfalls on the income side of the ledger.
- A new desk needs to be purchased for the pastor's office (Kevin had his own desk and took it with him). Consistory approved up to \$500 to cover the cost of a new pastor's desk.
- The amount of money that was transferred last month from the VanPutten Fund to cover the budget shortfall resulted in a difference of \$1,629 more being transferred than needed. Treasurer Jessica recommended paying the open sprinkler pump bill out of this pump for the new well originally estimated at \$1000. Extra work still needs to be done to close stuck valves to increase water pressure. Consistory approved to pay the pump bill out of the overage taken out of Wells Fargo to cover the cost of the pump as per Jessicas's request.
- Blood Drives will be discontinued as Mary VanWieren would like to step down. Donor numbers have also been down.
- Max Blumer reported that return to the Sanctuary has been a positive. Pulpit si\upply and lectionary plans are set through Labor Day into September to cover us up to the point that a transitional Pastor commences.
- ☐ First Wednesday Community Night class will be held outside on September 13th.




Parents Visit Student Center to hear Fall '23 Plans

And here we find ourselves, twelve years later, standing and staring, once again, at the abyss, the unknown, not knowing, and perhaps not fully trusting.

We are listening, and we hear you. Please know that our transition Team progress has been thoughtful, slow and steady as we seek to work on God's time and discern His will, not ours. The Lord has delivered to us an outstanding doorkeeper in Pastor Mark Waterstone from Rose Park Reformed Church as our Classis Supervisor. He has blessed us all with a thoughtful and solid Transition Catalyst for our Regional Synod in Tom Grabill, whom many of you got to hear speak in July as we began the transition. Tom has provided us with the names and profiles of a number of potential transition ministers and soon you will meet the one whom this team has been led to call.

Outreach & Missions Update:

Surviving in Haiti

By the Grace of God our partner organizations continue to function pretty well... Schools will start the new school year in Sept. Most of the schools in that area are functioning. So

far we have raised money for tuition, but are still in need of about \$30,000 for food for the students.

There is no way for us to get anything down to them except money for the food and education. It is unsafe for them to go into



Port au Prince. They must rely on the shopkeepers who pay a ransom to the gangs so they can hopefully get through the streets safely in order to get rice, oil, etc from the city. That of course makes the food extra expensive.

Please pray for their protection through the hurricane season and pray for a Kenyan military contingent that is assessing the situation and hoping to lead a U. N. effort to get the gangs under control and restore some order and control. This will be a huge undertaking and we are thankful that the Kenyans have initiated action. Pray for justice and peace.

We feel helpless from so far away, but we seek to continue to offer the education and food that we can. By the grace of God, together we are making a huge difference in the village of Neply! We thank God for each one of you who has a heart for Haiti and supports this work. — Blessings, Al and Holly

Know that the Spirit has been hard at work on all our hearts and we have laid our trust at His doorstep.

I can't help but return to Scripture and think of how crushed those disciples were on that late Thursday night, "that dark night of the soul," when they saw their captured savior Jesus being bound and led out of the Garden down into the Kidron Vally, across and up the steep incline, back through the Gates of Jerusalem. We can't even fathom the depth of their despair. Oh Lord! If they only knew then what God had planned...

And there I was, a pilgrim, 2,000 years after, standing among those Olive trees in that same Garden on a brillant May morning. Walking down that same Valley, with shepherded-led sheep bleating, and looking up at those same imposing city walls in tears. Rejoicing in the miracle which gives us all the Hope to go on, to face our future together as believers in His promise. Now God turns to us, challenging our "dead end" thinking.

And we trust in Him, because He abides. And because the Good Lord *always* delivers.
